Dear Trinitarians

Welcome back everyone – I hope you managed to have some rest over the half term period. You will have seen this week was full of different announcements about coming out of lockdown and how the exams are going to look this year. This week we have been working hard to ensure our risk assessment is adapted, consulting on arrangements and pulling together our final plans. We are very excited about pupils returning to school from the 8th of March – we do have to make sure their return is safe though and you will receive specific letters explaining the specifics before your son / daughter does come back formally. Please look out for these letters.

The organisation and arrangements around the site are very similar to September for pupils, please do put your children's mind at ease. They will still be in year group bubbles and the expectation of hand sanitation will of course continue. It is vital we ask you to follow the national information and attached is a key letter from the Metropolitan Police reinforcing the need for pupils to come straight to school at the start of the day and straight home at the end. They should not be going to shops or waiting for friends. National Lockdown is still in place from the 8th of March. This is also important for parents – if you are picking up your children it is vital that you keep your distance from each other families and wear face coverings. As a school we will also still be running meetings with parents remotely until further notice. We need to keep the community safe – and this is only achieved if we are all working together and we are all vigilant.

We also need to ask you to keep children at home if they are ill and seek a test straight away if they have COVID symptoms. No member of our school community should come into the school if they have COVID symptoms or someone in their house has COVID symptoms. If in doubt seek a test. If another member of your household is ill with COVID 19 symptoms then you should also all stay at home until you get a test and only return if the test is negative or if positive return after 10 days. Do keep us informed throughout. This again keeps the school community a safe place.

Across both sites the staff will be having a Lateral Flow Test twice a week. This identifies asymptomatic COVID cases, people carrying the virus without having any of the symptoms. By doing these tests we are again protecting our community. Within the secondary phase we will be testing all the pupils with consent on their return to school. They will get 3 tests within school and then provided with packs to take home to continue the Lateral Flow Tests for the immediate future. It is vital we do all we can to keep our whole community safe. To enable us to test all the secondary pupils on their return we do have to have a gradual return of pupils from the 8th of March. There will be no Key Worker Provision this week as we will have to secure our separate bubbles within the school, but we have created a plan with a day turn around for each year group. See the grid below to see which day the pupils will be returning, and when they will be getting their Lateral Flow Test.

To help prevent the spread of COVID 19 the government has also changed its expectations of mask wearing within schools. For primary pupils this does not change to what it was like in September. For secondary there is now an expectation that pupils will be wearing masks whilst in the building throughout the day – even during lessons. This is a change. Pupils will therefore be expected to come to school with their own masks, and must wear them at all times. As they do get wet and damp whilst wearing them we suggest they have at least 3 with them, so they can change them throughout the day. If they break or there is a problem the school will have spares, but we do expect pupils to have their own stock. They will be allowed to take them off when outside and when eating. We have changed our spaces to ensure all year groups will be able to be outside during break and lunchtime each day so that they do get time without the mask on. We do have pupils who are exempt from wearing masks due to medical reasons, these have been issued a laminated card that they will be expected to wear on a lanyard – making it clear for all to see. Wearing masks does reduce the risk of COVID 19 and the government has said they would review this at Easter.

All first tests will be carried out in the morning before they go to lessons. Second and third tests will involve pupils being taken out of class to have these tests carried out.

This started at Christmas with detailed letters being sent to our year 11 pupils and regular engagement trackers indicating the grades they are currently working at. This will all form the evidence base for the grades that will eventually be given.

Finally can I thank you for all your continued support and kind words. Teachers are preparing for the return of pupils, which is why we changed our INSET day. We want to ensure we all return and fit immediately back into the flow of learning in school. This Wednesday coming is therefore an INSET day, but not an additional one, we have moved the one from April to this date. When we return from Easter it will be a full school day. Stay safe this week and look out for a more detailed letter of instruction ready for your child's return.


We cannot emphasise enough how glad we are that children will be back on the 8th March.


WORLD BOOK DAY


Changing lives through a love of books and shared reading.



Police will be Monitoring and issuing fines to parents



Dear Parent/Guardian

The Metropolitan Police Safer Schools Team based at Lewisham Police Station are asking parents/guardians to support the police by encouraging their children to not breach current government COVID restrictions before and after school. This is for the protection of themselves and others during this global pandemic.

Safer Schools police officers will be patrolling before and after school in the Lewisham High Street, Forest Hill, Deptford/New Cross and Catford Broadway areas to enforce any breaches of COVID-19 restrictions. We will be engaging with any groups and encouraging them to leave the area and explain to them the importance of social distancing.

If a student is seen to breach COVID-19 restrictions, officers will contact the student's school for appropriate sanctions to be taken, in line with the Education Act. Should the advice be ignored and public safety is compromised, officers have the option to take enforcement action. This includes the option to issue fixed penalty notices to parents or quardians of children who are not following the rules.

We would ask parents and guardians to take the practical steps to check the current position and ensure your child is not committing an offence by breaching COVID-19 restrictions.

We all need to continue to do our part to prevent the spread of the virus.

AWARDING OF GCSE GRADES SUMMER 2021

As you will have seen in the press this week, the Department for Education & Ofqual (the regulatory body for exams) announced their plans for how GCSE & A Level grades should be awarded to pupils this year in lieu of examinations. The full document can be read here but I wanted to update parents and pupils in Year 11 on the plans we have at Trinity to ensure that every pupil has the opportunity to achieve the grades they have the potential for.

In January 2021 when I last wrote to Year 11 parents & pupils we already knew that qualifications would be awarded on the basis of some form of teacher assessed grade which was evidenced through the submission of pupil work. This has now been confirmed and the range of evidence that teachers can draw upon to inform their judgements of pupil grades includes –

- pupil work produced in response to assessment materials provided by the exam board, including groups of questions, past papers or similar materials such as practice or sample papers
- 2. pupil work produced in centre-devised tasks that reflect the specification, that follow the same format as exam board materials and have been marked in a way that reflects exam board mark schemes this can include:
 - substantial class or homework (including those that took place during remote learning)
 - · internal tests taken by pupils
 - mock exams taken over the course of study
- 3. records of each pupil's progress and performance over the course of study.

As you may know, we had begun from 25th January 2021 a fortnightly remote assessment cycle to collect exactly this type of evidence about the performance of Year 11 whilst working at home. This assessment cycle will now revert to being undertaken in school when we open fully to all pupils from 8th March. This means that face-to-face teaching can resume which we are all hugely looking forward to and that the planned next set of full exams can be taken in school in the week commencing 15th March. An exam timetable will be sent out shortly to Year 11 pupils. I would once again emphasise that the results from the ongoing assessment cycle will form the foundation for the evidence teachers will use to determine overall subject grades over time for pupils. It is vitally important that your child actively engages with the assessments for each subject so they are enabled to demonstrate their knowledge, understanding & skills.

Exam boards will publish guidance in March, so teachers have a clear understanding of how to make fair and consistent judgements. The exam boards will provide assessment materials at the end of March. These questions will be provided with mark schemes, exemplar responses and data on past performance where available, to assist teachers in making fair and consistent judgements of the standard of a pupil's performance. We hope these assessment materials will be released in time for us to use alongside the wealth of materials staff can already access.

You will also know that we have been using for all year groups and weekly for Year 11 "Engagement Tracker" reports— these are to keep you informed and aware of how well your child is participating in online virtual lessons, if they are completing class & homework, are punctual to the lesson and their overall performance. We will be continuing with these reports for Year 11 in order to use them as one of the pieces of evidence we consider for grade allocation. We will also be using the engagement tracker reports as reference documents for 6th form reference requests.

The final submission dates to the exam boards is 18th June with GCSE results day nominated as August 12th. Exam boards will complete checks of the evidence for a sample of pupil grades in a sample of subjects, in a sample of schools and colleges over June and July. Exam boards will decide whether the grades determined by the centre following quality assurance are a reasonable exercise of academic judgement of the pupils' demonstrated performance. Exam boards will not re-mark the pupil's evidence or give an alternative grade. Grades would only be changed by the board if they are not satisfied with the outcome of an investigation.

So now that we have some clarity around the process schools are expected to undertake to award grades and are confident that we have been doing this properly and a date for the return of pupils to school it only leaves me to say that I would like to sincerely thank you again for all your help & support in together doing all we can to alleviate pupils concerns around their GCSE grades and Post-16 provision. It is crucial that just like last year, the most important thing is that Year 11 pupils remain positive, optimistic and continue to study to make sure that they are awarded grades that they can be proud of. Please do contact Ms. Clarke or myself should you have any further questions and we look forward to Year 11 back in school.

On Tuesday 23rd February, we had an exciting event for some of our students. They participated in a BBC **Sport** webinar with reporters, commentators and producers. It was part of the Digital Cities Virtual program to discuss different careers, in this case, sport journalism.

You may have heard of commentators **John Murray**, **Seb Hutchinson** and **Sarah Orchard**. The webinar was a great opportunity for young people to hear from the experts and ask questions about the skills they need if they want to work in sport.

Participating in the BBC Sports webinar zoom call was an interesting experience for me because it taught me how BBC Sports use the most tending things in their own way, so they can show it to the younger audience. The digital producer, Chris, mentioned how they publish information around the world, by the use of social media. He explained that the internet is the best place to post all your ideas for people to see it. Also, it made me think how interesting sports journalism is, as I kind of had no interest before the zoom call. It showed that using other platforms to presents it is not only good, but for the younger generation like myself to be inspired by it. Overall, this was good opportunity from my teacher for me to learn that there more about sports journalism and how it can present in ways that is not complicated.

On Tuesday 23rd February, I participated in a careers event organised by the BBC YOUNG REPORTER SCHEME. I have aspirations of becoming a professional player and also a sports journalist. There was a full day of three key webinars from 10am – 2.45pm. The first webinar detailed how to become a sports reporter. There was advice on the actual steps you can consider and the qualifications required to pursue your dreams. Lauren Moore from BBC sports, was one of the guest panelists and started her career from being involved in the young reporter scheme at her secondary school. Lauren confirmed that there are many women working in the BBC but for a long time it was a male dominated industry. You could use the chat function to pose questions directly. I posed a question which was selected and it also went on to open a debate about creative ideas and IP.

The second webinar covered the Six Nations Rugby Tournament. The BBC Sports Commentators, also work on Match of the Day and BBC Five they predominantly use their voices only, from time to time they may appear in front of the camera so must be prepared at all times for any eventuality. They retold stories about World cup commentating and working alongside international journalists. It is very important to look after your voice as a commentator. We were encouraged to write about subjects we liked and to read varied literature. {This segment was covered by BBC journalists John Murray, Seb Hutchinson and Sara Orchard}

The final webinar covered BBC digital storytelling, social media, music and visual effects. Digital producer, Chris Pugh explained why social media and video journalism is so important for BBC Sports. He showed examples of TikTok, Instagram and Snapchat by explaining how you adapt stories for different social media sites and audiences. I have attended many webinars and this was by far one of the very best online events. The language was very easy to understand and he went into greater depth about his job role and why he is happy creating content for us to enjoy.

Sport has a magical way of uniting people locally, nationally and internationally. Physical movement is great for your mental health and wellbeing.

This undoubtedly was one of the finest career advice days, I have a greater understanding of how to achieve what I want to become.
