Dear Trinitarians

Welcome back everyone, I hope you had an amazing Easter break. We have had a great week getting back into routines and developing our knowledge and skills within the classroom. Our focus is on Knowledge this half term – to ensure pupils are getting ready for end of year tests that will demonstrate progress over time. We will be doing a lot of work around the power of knowledge and strategies for improving our memory during this time. A huge thank you to our Trinity Family for the warm welcome of our new Head of Primary Phase – Amanda Harvey. The planned handover period has had a huge impact with such a smooth transition over time.

Year 11 are working hard for their last 6 weeks to make a difference to their final GCSE grades. We have worked hard creating an assessment cycle that is transparent to all to ensure we get the evidence required for the Teacher Assessed Grades. We have internal and external moderation / validation processes in place to ensure the grades issued are a true reflection of what the pupils have achieved. After half term we will be moderating and then sending the evidence off. To facilitate this additional processes we have had to set up additional meetings, one of which does involve an early closure (Friday 11th June) for the secondary site as it does involve 20 members of staff. Work will be set on Teams during this period so that pupils do not miss out on learning. Thank you for your support with this.

This week was Stephen Lawrence Day. Stephen Lawrence Day is about the part we all play in creating a society in which everyone can flourish. It is an opportunity for children and young people to have their voices heard, make the changes they'd like to see and create a society that treats everyone with fairness and respect. At Trinity we used this time to discuss Stephen's story and to look at how we can continue to change what we do within the school and how we can all help change society around us. The Stephen Lawrence Day website has a video that we shared within school – if you have not seen this please do look this up. This is a celebration of the community standing together.

Yesterday was also Earth Day and the theme was 'Restore Our Earth'. There has been a series of televised events which can all be downloaded from the internet. The BBC iPlayer has a wealth of programs from 'Greta Thunberg's story', David Attenborough investigating the loss of biodiversity happening around us in 'Extinction: The facts' and 'What if everyone in the world Planted a Tree?' Understanding the environment around us is the first step in ensuring that we act to protect it.

Thank you again for all your support. Can I remind you that the school is still running our strict COVID risk assessment? If pupils have any of the COVID symptoms please keep them off of school and immediately get a test. It is extremely important that we do not get complacent at this time. The secondary site will continue to run a COVID test in school every Monday for those with consent. We do expect pupils to then have a home test on Thursday of each week, which they should upload. We will be giving more packs for home use this Monday coming. Have a great and safe week.

RECEPTION NEWS

The children were excited and enthusiastic to return to school after the Easter break! The Reception team could not wait to start this term and our new topics. Our team has changed a little since September with the addition of Miss Jones.



Mrs. Thompson has left Reception to support Year 6. Here is a picture of the team!

This half term our topic is 'Where in the World?' our main topic driver will be geography. Each week we will read a different book which is set in a different part of the world, this will help us to explore a range of different countries and locations.

This week we are reading 'Naughty Bus' by Jan Oke, a story about a mischievous red bus who gets into some predicaments on its journey. The children thought about the colour of the bus, which led them to the realisation that the bus is a London bus! This inspired lots of bus related artwork and creativity!

The Reception team set up a role play bus in the middle room for the children to use. The children had access to tickets, maps, uniforms, bus timetables and even a steering wheel! The children loved pretending to drive around London. The drivers particularly enjoyed the ticket checking responsibility. This role play provided lots of opportunities for conversation and language development!

Our focus on London this week also led us to explore a number of famous London landmarks. We explored the Tower of London, the Cutty Sark, Nelson's Column as well as Tower Bridge and Buckingham Palace. Ethan was inspired to create his own Tower Bridge!

Next week, our focus book will be 'No room for a baby roo!' it is set in the Australian outback. If you and your children have been lucky enough to visit Australia we would love to hear about your time there, please feel free to send in any pictures for your child to show the class!

As well as our main geography topic focus, we are also focussing on science this term. We have chosen to think about materials. The children thought about the materials they recognised around the classroom and categorised some objects based on the material they were made from.

During our Phonics lessons this week, we focussed on words which begin with vowel sounds and end in consonants, such as end or ink (VCC). We highlighted what the vowel sounds were and spoke about them being softer sounds, which often

fall in the middle of a word. Next week we will be looking at longer words with 4 sounds (CVCC) such as wind! Have a chat with your child at home can you think of any words which have 4 sounds?

Oral segmenting and blending games are so important in continuing to support your child's phonetic journey, they are quick and easy and require no resources. You could try orally segmenting some (CVCC) 4 sound words for them and ask them to blend them together!

Reception and Year 1 are sending home a wider range of books to support children's learning, Mr Weddell has explained the new reading books in this handy video:

This week we have been looking at subitising in our maths lessons. Subitising is the rapid recognition of a quantity. A good way to talk about subitising and practice the skill is by playing games which use a dice, if you have a dice at home why not practice together?!

Next week we will be thinking about number bonds to 10, a good game to begin thinking about number bonds in bowling; there are ten pins, the number knocked down and the number still standing are a bond or pair of numbers which come together to make 10. If you have any pins at home or toys and a ball why not set up a game to play together and start talking about number bonds!

As you know, each week, the children write about the book we are reading. The children use story maps to guide and support their writing. The better the children know a story the more confident they are to write about it. In previous terms we have sent home story summary's, this term, where possible we will be sending home links to a reading of the story on YouTube. Why not sit with your child and enjoy the story for the next week together?!

PRIMARY NEWS!

In year 4 this week the children have really enjoyed starting their new book, Varjak Paw, as well as writing a diary entry from the perspective of the main character. In science they have started their topic on sound and in Wider Curriculum they have begun their topic called It Takes Guts!, which is all about Nobel Peace Prize winners Nelson Mandela and Malala Yousafzai. This week, they have wowed us with their chronology skills and have ordered the events of Nelson Mandela's life up to his arrest. They also wrote about how he would have felt at different stages in his early life and debated whether both of his arrests were justified.





In Year 3 this week, we have been busy with our first lessons in our Geography topic 'Roaming the Rainforest'.


We began by learning about Biomes and then used our map skills and knowledge of keys to identify different biomes around the world.

Next, we focussed on the Rainforest biome, noticing how rainforests are close to the equator where it is hot and wet.



Finally, we zoomed in on the Amazon Rainforest, using Atlases to identify which countries share this amazing place. How fascinating!

Year One's science knowledge has been **growing** this week as we start our new topic on **plants**!






We started by recapping facts we know about **seasons** and linking this to our new learning about **deciduous** and **evergreen** trees! We researched the different types of trees and how they may look throughout the year. We finished by sorting these trees and annotating them with any key facts we could remember.



We are so excited to keep expanding our understanding of plants and even getting to grow our own later this term!

This week, Year 5 started our Victorious Victorians topic by finding out about key events from the era and creating a chronological map. We began our reading book for this term 'Street Child' which describes the journey of a young boy growing up in Victorian times. Our focus artist this term is Wassily Kandinsky, who was one of the pioneers of abstract art. During our Science lessons, we have been continuing our topic of states of matter. Ask us about the difference between irreversible and reversible changes! We've been really impressed with the children's writing as they retold a story in beautiful detail and with excellent control. Check out Kobie's amazing writing below! Next week in Maths, we move onto decimals and are focusing on arithmetic skills. Please look out for your child's weekly arithmetic challenge to see how they have been getting on.

1K - Thomas is getting the caring badge for consistently helping to keep our playground tidy, picking up litter, discarded fruit and making sure his classmates have all their belongings.


2S - Elijah will be getting the reflective badge for the care and thought he has been taking in his learning, particularly in his handwriting and spellings.


This week we celebrated St George's day, earth day and we participated in Stephen Lawrence Day which was on the 22nd April.



Walk The Line Sculpture Trail.

Walk The Line between The O2 and Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park to see sculptures from leading artists among the docks and waterways of east London. The capital's biggest #sculpture trail leads walkers along three miles of waterways, including the Royal Docks and the River Lea, as well as soaring over the Thames on the Emirates Air Line. You can start from either end of The Line. The works on the trail including sculptures by *Damien Hirst* and *Antony Gormley* are free to view, but to do the whole thing in one day you will need to pay for a short DLR journey and the cablecar. Each work is illuminated at night-time for late strollers to enjoy. Happy hiking!

Illuminated River is a long-term art installation transforming the Thames at night with an orchestrated series of light works that span nine bridges in central London. Its subtly moving sequences of LED light symbolically unify the Thames bridges, drawing inspiration from the spirit and history of the river and the architectural and engineering heritage of its bridges. The first four bridges – London, Cannon Street, Southwark, and Millennium, were completed in July 2019. Five more bridges – Blackfriars, Waterloo, Golden Jubilee, Westminster, and Lambeth have been illuminated this month.

A robot travels in a straight line at constant speed between markers. At each marker, the robot's speed instantly increases by the number on the marker it passes (in metres per second).



CHEF'S CORNER





Year 9 have been looking at international cuisines, we have started on British cuisines and then the versatility of the potato across Scotland, Northern Ireland, Wales and England. They did a great job of understanding how different countries interpret the same food product.





Potato scones

250g potato cut into cubes 200g plain flour 1tsp baking powder 50g butter

3tbsp. Milk 2 eggs

- Cook the potatoes, drain and mash, sift the flour, baking powder, butter, milk and eggs to the potato, mix until you reach a sticky dough consistency.
- Heat some oil in the pan and fry dollops in the pan, 3 minutes each side until golden brown

Bangers and mash

1 large potato

1 tbsp. Butter 2tbsp. Milk

2 sausages

2tsp gravy granules

- 1. Grill the sausages in a pan on hot oil.
- Cut the potatoes into cubes and boil until tender.
- Drain the potatoes and add the butter and milk to make it smooth
- 4. Boil a kettle and follow the instructions to make the gravy

Boxty potatoes

350g grated raw potatoes 125g plain flour

l egg

1 fbsp Milk

125g mashed potatoes

- Toss the grated potatoes with flour in a large bowl and add the mashed potatoes.
- In a separate bowl, whisk the egg, milk and then add to the potatoes
- Heat some oil in a saucepan, drop the mixture into the pan to make patties. Fry on both sides for 3-4 minutes until golden brown. Drain on a paper towel

Tatws Pum Munud

20 small white potatoes

6 slices of bacon

240ml chicken stock

1 onion finely chopped

- Thinly slice the potatoes and leave in water to prevent browning
- Cook the bacon in a frying pan and then remove and set aside on a plate.
- Add stock and onions to the pan and the potatoes (drained) to simmer for 8 minutes until tender
- 4. Place the bacon on top to present

How to Make a Solar Still

Find a sunny spot to place your solar still. It should be a spot that gets sun almost all day.

 Start by pouring an inch or two of water into your large plastic bucket.

To really demonstrate how a solar still can be used to clean and purify drinking water, we decided to use water from our pond. You could also add a bit of dirt to tap water or just use clean water to begin with. The choice is yours.

- Place your clean glass jar in the center of your bucket. Be careful not to get any of the dirty water inside the jar.
- Cover the bucket with plastic wrap.

Your plastic wrap needs to form a good seal around the bucket. Some brands of plastic wrap will cling tight, but if yours doesn't want to stay put try using a large rubber band or a bit of tape.

• Finally, place a small rock on top of the plastic wrap, right over the jar.

Then let your solar still sit undisturbed for several hours.

With the help of the sun, the water will evaporate and then collect on the plastic wrap.

The water droplets will then run towards the center because of the rock and fall into the jar, producing clean water that is safe to drink.





Water for survival!

Piece of plastic and a container is all you need to survive (a drinking tube is great) but if you don't have one you can still collect water and drink from container.



Another fun twist to this experiment is to try it using salty water. The water that collects in the jar won't taste salty and will be perfect for drinking.

While this isn't the fastest way to purify water, this DIY solar still is effective.

We let our **solar still experiment** sit in the sun all day and wound up with about an inch of drinkable water.
