Dear Trinitarians

We have had a fabulous week across the school. Our Trinitarians are truly amazing. We have rapid progress in the classrooms and the pupils have been developing their skills across their subjects. I wish to thank you as parents again for your full support – in helping support the positive attitude of all our pupils.

Next week is the national Walk To School Week. This is an annual event to encourage children and their parents to walk to school and is organised by Living Streets. To support this we are welcoming families to start bringing bikes and scooters back to school. Walking to school is a brilliant way to get active and healthy – without even realising you are exercising. It will also help to reduce congestion especially around schools, reduce pollution and give our children some exercise. Give it a go...

From May 17th the government has changed the Covid rules as they continue their road map on reducing restrictions due to the decrease in cases across the country. To reflect this we are in the primary phase allowing bikes and scooters back on site and are changing a few of the layouts in the classrooms. In the Secondary, masks will still need to be worn in the building and around in the corridors. Within the classroom it will be optional for pupils to take off their mask. If teachers request masks to be worn, or pupils are taking part in a practical lesson, then pupils must immediately follow the instructions given. Pupils will still need to wear masks going into shops and when using public transport. In the secondary phase we will also be continuing to carry out the Lateral Flow Tests for all pupils with consent each week on Monday to ensure we maintain a safe school environment. We do ask families to ensure the second test, the home test, is carried out on a Thursday each week as well.

The other Covid rules will continue. We are maintaining our bubbles, frequently using the hand sanitisers and still keeping our staggered starts and ends to the day. Keeping the school and its community safe is paramount. When further announcements happen from the government we will review our practices and risk assessment to ensure we are evaluating all our procedures. We will keep communicating any changes with you via this newsletter.

Please do have a wonderful weekend. Spend quality time making memories and stay safe.

There was also lots of poetry reading and dissecting happening this week. Year 5 practiced their reading, both coral and echo. It gave me chills....it was so scary!



RECEPTION NEWS

This week our intrepid explorers in Reception journeyed to the South Pole as we read Oliver Jeffers book 'Lost and Found'.




The book tells that story of a boy who befriends a penguin. The boy believes the penguin is lost, so he takes him back to the South Pole on a boat only to discover that the penguin wasn't lost, it was lonely!



The children were captivated by the idea of the boy rowing the penguin to the South Pole, they used their knowledge and understanding of materials from their World lessons on materials to decide which resources they could use to build a boat. Lots of children chose to build their own boats and the junk modelling table; they tested their boats in water to see if they floated.



The math's tables were very buys this week, the children really enjoyed using number lines to solve addition problems!



Next week we will be reading 'Pattan's Pumpkin' by Chitra Soundar. Below is a link to the story, have a listen over the weekend! The story is set in India, have you or your family ever been to India? Can you bring in any pictures for us to look at? Our math's focus next week will be subtraction and during phonics we will be focusing on building words with the 'sh' digraph. PRIMARY NEWS!

In year 4 this week, the children have been writing a retell of a chapter of Varjak paw, using a range of fronted adverbials and punctuation for speech. In maths, they have been practising their division skills, applying their partitioning method to help them. How would you find $84 \div 4$?

In wider curriculum, the children have been learning about a second Nobel Peace Prize winner, Malala Yousafzai! They have learned about the speech she made, aged just 11, and the consequences this had for her life. In science, they produced a scatter graph to show the change in pitch when we add water to a glass. Interestingly, we found out that glasses that looked identical produced totally different pitches when tapped with a spoon!



In RE, they have been thinking about how everyday life would be lived by a Buddhist following the 8-fold path. Take a look at the blog to see their role play and some of their wonderful outcomes this week.

What would a normal day look like for a Buddhist following the 8-fold path?

This half term in Year 3 we have been busy perfecting our typing skills using BBC Dance Mat.

We have learned the correct position for our hands on the keyboard and which fingers should be used for which keys.

We are also using Purple Mash to try to improve our speed with different typing games.



In Year 5 this week, we have been using our persuasive skills to write discussion texts comparing Victorian ragged schools and schools today. Ask us about some of the awful things they did in ragged schools!




In Year 5 math's' we have applied our decimal and fractions knowledge to percentages and we are now able to compare and order all three. In art this week, we focused on Kandinsky's concentric circles and created our own pieces using soft pastels. We really enjoyed our reading lessons this week which were based on three Space poems!



Year 6 have made fantastic progress in maths. They are able to use a protractor accurately and identify the missing angles on a straight line and in a circle. They use their calculations to helps them solve reasoning problems.





This week the pupils have been reading poetry from their class anthologies! Each poem was chosen for the pupils to listen to, perform and discuss the themes.



The anthologies were chosen because they matched a wider curriculum topic or because they were packed full of brilliant classics and modern poems. Our second poetry week is next half term - we can't wait!



Year One enjoyed exploring different textures for their art work today. They created collages using different materials.



Remember to leave the tops on!


CHEF'S CORNER


Aisha has strip of paper with the numbers 1,2,3,4 and 5 written in 5 cells.
