
In Year 3 last year, our current Year 4 children were involved in the start of a project involving the artist Steve McQueen.

Uniform consultation

Further to the consultation on uniform that recently took place the governors and Executive Headteacher have considered all the responses, and have decided to make minor amendments and clarify our uniform policy without making any substantive changes. We had under 5% of the school population respond to the consultation, and of those that responded we had points raised equally from opposite perspectives. We did consider all the points raised and feel that as the response was low, we can conclude that on the whole parents are happy with the uniform we have. As several parents pointed out, any major changes would have cost implications and many felt the uniform was both smart and flexible. Our uniform allows us to be seen as a collective community, gives our pupils a clear identity, and is one of our unique selling points. It can also promote a sense of inclusiveness, non-discrimination and equal opportunity.

We have had several people question supplier and quality, and the governing body had asked the school to investigate this earlier this year, a process that occurs at regular intervals. The school reviewed the quality, standards and reviews on line of all providers and came to the conclusion that our current provider was the most appropriate option considering quality, cost and service. We have subsequently passed on to our supplier all feedback from the survey to help them develop and improve their products and service. We thank all the parents, guardians, teachers and pupils who fed back on the consultation. We agree with feedback that in the past the standards have not always been easy to apply, as there were several unclear aspects of the uniform policy. We have therefore taken this as an opportunity to clarify our uniform in the grid below and will expect these standards across the school from September 2020. The PE sweatshirts in the primary are optional, and will be phased out over time in favour of the PE hoody currently worn in the secondary. Spare uniform will be kept at the school to ensure pupils without the correct uniform can be dressed appropriately. Please do read the information in the grid carefully and check your son / daughters uniform does comply with this policy. Thank you once again for your support.

PUPIL REPORT by Tommy Melliush

This is the pupil report, a weekly section of the newsletter, where you gain some insight into the life of a Trinity pupil. This week in the pupil report, I will discuss the reaction of Year 11s to the RE speaker Year 11s had on Thursday afternoon and their new carousel groups as well as talking about events that occurred this week and a brief mental health notice.

Firstly, on Thursday afternoon, during period 5 and 6, Year 11s got the opportunity to listen to an RE speaker, set up by Miss Alder, in which, a Muslim speaker from Birmingham Intel lectured us on the topic of Islam and important revision material for re in the future. Many pupils prior to the session was not looking forward to it for reasons including when the session was scheduled, clashing with our PE lesson. The session lasted 2 hours and overall the perception I have seen from the questioned pupils after the session is that there was definitely some useful information for the future and for some this was very productive, many pupils found the session not to be that productive because of how long the session was and also the fact it occurred during PE which is a very popular subject in school which caused a lot of negativity before and after the talk.

Also, Year 11s received their new carousel groups which was set up based on the weak points of their PPE1 results. For some, this saw new carousel changes for some, no change for others. Anyone who was previously in the high flyer carousel has now been put in a subject carousel. Overall, the perception I've seen so far of everyone's new carousel has been rather positive however due to our new carousels only being carried out on Wednesday, I will not be holding an interview with anyone this week about carousels to allow pupils to properly settle in to their new carousels before interviewing. This interview will be featured in next week's edition of the Pupil Report.

On Tuesday and Wednesday, art students of year 11 completed their mock art exam. If you would like to see some of the amazing pieces created you can check it out on the schools twitter or the art departments Instagram account. I asked 1 art student how they thought the exam went and they replied, "I'm really happy with my work, I feel it's easily one of my best pieces I've made." On Thursday, many trips took place including 2 year 11 trips, 1 a cloud 9 trip about maths, to help those who are targeting 7-9 in maths improve and the other, an add maths trip which I went on, rewarding add maths student for their hard work. Miss Di Ricci led the trip of 10 as we travelled to the Phoenix theatre near Tottenham Court Road. We went to see a maths inspiration show where Matt Parker, Rob Eastaway, Hannah Fry and Colin Wright all showed us important uses of maths in the future. Matt Parker was host of the show, Rob Eastaway, talked about how estimation is one of the topics many students post 16 seem to struggle on, showing us how important and easy it is, promoting his new book, Maths on the Back on an Envelope. Hannah Fry, showed us some exclusive experiments which will feature when she appears in the Royal Institution Christmas lecture on BBC 4, decoding life's hidden numbers and Colin Wright who talked about patterns and predictions whilst demonstrating his exceptional juggling skills. Overall, I found the two and a half hour show interesting in terms of content, a bit un-interactive, but overall a really good show and a massive thanks to Miss Di Ricci for allowing me to go on the trip even though I don't do add maths.

For this week's mental health notice, I will be writing about the statistics of the amount of people suffering with mental health problems. Did you know that 1 on 4 people suffer with mental health problems each year? Also, a staggering 676 million people suffer from mental health problems worldwide. Over a third of the public think people with a mental health issue are likely to be violent. Also, people with mental ill health are more dangerous to themselves than to others: 80-90% of people who die by suicide are experiencing mental distress. Finally, Poor mental health impacts on individuals and thin lost income, lower educational attainment, quality of life and a much shorter life span. All of these mind-blowing stats show one thing: mental health is no joke and if you are or know someone who is suffering, get help.
