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Dear Trinitarians

Trinity has been holding its head up high and tackling key issues head on – like we always do. I walk around the entire site at least twice a week, and carry out learning walks every day. What do I see? I see amazing learning, dedicated and talented teachers and a clear determination for all to progress and improve. I am extremely proud of our Trinity family.

We are in the middle of anti-bullying fortnight here at Trinity and we have had a consistent message for all the pupils. We will not tolerate Bullying at Trinity. During this week we have been running a series of assemblies and workshops on what bullying is. Through pupil voice we have made a distinction between pupils that are being rude, pupils that are being mean and those that are bullying. Rude is inadvertently saying or doing something that hurts someone else. From pupils, rudeness might look more like jumping ahead in line, bragging about achieving the highest grade, laughing at someone's hair or even throwing a crushed up pile of leaves in someone's face. On their own, any of these behaviours could appear as elements of bullying, but when looked at in context, incidents of rudeness are usually spontaneous, unplanned inconsideration, based on thoughtlessness, poor manners or narcissism, but not meant to actually hurt someone. Mean is purposefully saying or doing something to hurt someone once (or maybe a few times). The main distinction between 'rude' and 'mean' behaviour has to do with intention; while rudeness is often unintentional, mean behaviour very much aims to hurt or depreciate someone. Pupils can be mean to each other when they criticize clothing, appearance, intelligence, coolness or anything else they can find to denigrate. Meanness also sounds like words spoken in anger - impulsive cruelty that is often regretted in short order. Make no mistake; mean behaviours can wound deeply and staff at Trinity will hold pupils accountable for being mean. Bullying is an intentionally aggressive behaviour, repeated over time; that involves an imbalance of power. Experts agree that bullying entails three key elements: an intent to harm, a power imbalance and repeated acts or threats of aggressive behaviour. Bullying may be physical, verbal, relational or carried out via technology. All reports of bullying are acted upon immediately at Trinity. Sometimes when we look into instances we feel they were more 'mean' or 'rude' acts, but all situations are investigated and action is put into place. Pupils across the school have been given many scenarios to consider and have thought about what bullying may look like. We have also looked at how being an Outstanding Trinitarian is someone that would stand up to injustice and would be caring to support all members of our school community. Bullying is a battle that we need to work on together - to stamp it out. These workshops will continue into next week.

Eunice Adeoyo* (Handford 2016-2018)

Eunice came to Lancing in the Sixth Form from Trinity School in Lewisham, one of our partner schools. She made a great impact in all areas of life at Lancing as well as being completely herself. From Amnesty to essay prizes; prefectship to charity term; academics to music, she drank deep of all that Lancing has to offer – and gave a great deal too.



Eunice made a lasting impression on her teachers; she had the air of the scholar about her and a very clear moral compass which she used daily to help her navigate her decisions and actions. She came across as a socially aware young woman who was a real asset to the Lancing community. Eunice revelled in participation, she challenged herself academically, tried new activities and made many, many friends. On top of all that she was recognised for all these qualities and was a wonderful Head Girl. It was thrilling to watching such an intelligent, committed and compassionate young woman chart her course.

Eunice spoke on Founder's Day to a group of nearly 1,000 parents, OLs and pupils about the Foundationers Campaign and what it meant to her to be involved with the programme. Like Paige, Eunice has joined the University Ambassadors group and taken time to speak with the new cohort of Foundationers, encouraging them to make the most of their Lancing experience.

"My time at Lancing College is something that I am very grateful for. The two years spent at the College were transformative. The sense of community at Lancing is unrivalled, my teachers and peers were instrumental in shaping me intellectually. People came from a variety of different countries which meant I was exposed to a range of cultures and developed a greater awareness of the world around me. My Lancing bursary was worth more than its numerical value, it gave me the access to opportunities that I would not have had otherwise and the chance to create memories that I will cherish forever."






CONGRATULATIONS TO YEAR 10 ENVISION GROUP
