Dear Trinitarians

We have had a very busy week with a whole school review. Your son / daughter may have come home talking about visitors in the school looking around and questioning teachers and pupils about what we were doing. These external professionals were bought in to help us evaluate where we are as a school and identify areas that we can continue to work and improve on. It is part of our evaluation process. To ensure we are always outward looking and self-improving we look to pupils, parents, staff and external people to help us look at our impact and ensure we are providing the best education for all our pupils. We had a team of 4 external professionals visit the secondary site for a day and 2 at the primary. Both teams were extremely complementary about our pupil's amazing behaviour around the site and fantastic attitude to learning within the classroom. They felt the subject knowledge of our teachers was phenomenal, with one visitor saying they have never seen such a high quality curriculum in all the schools they have visited. Yet again I am extremely proud of our hard working and talented staff – and our amazing pupils. I wish to personally thank them all for their dedication and determination – they are definitely living life to the full.

We do of course have some areas to continue to work on to ensure we are always evolving and securing Trinity's impact. We will continue to develop all our leaders and our pupils as leaders across the school as well as to look at ways to continually challenge our pupils. Please can we ask you to keep asking questions of your son /daughter when they come home. To see what they have learnt and how they have practiced their skills. In the secondary phase please talk to your son / daughter about their knowledge organisers. Do look back at the previous knowledge organisers from before Christmas as well - all the knowledge needs to stick and stay in their memory. It is worth keeping them, do they still have last year's knowledge organisers? These documents show the accumulation of knowledge the pupils are developing over time. Half term is a great opportunity to revisit these.

Straight after half term we start our Trinity Futures programme. This does extend across the whole school, with an increase in intensity of activity within the secondary phase. This looks at different career pathways and opportunities to enable pupils to explore different avenues of their own interests. Please do talk about different jobs that are around us and how many opportunities there are at home. Talk about what you wanted to do when you were younger, and that it is fine to have strong ideas and to change these ideas over time. The future job markets are constantly changing along with technology, so pupils need to be open-minded when thinking about their futures.

1. Preventing spread of infection


There are general principles you can follow to help prevent the spread of respiratory viruses, including:

- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol if soap and water are not available. This is particularly important after taking public transport
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick
- If you feel unwell, stay at home, do not attend work or school
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in a bin. See Catch it, Bin it, Kill it
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces in the home and work environment






