World book day is yet again a tremendous success at Trinity School. Evidence suggests that children who read for enjoyment not only perform better in reading tests but also develop a broader vocabulary, increased general knowledge and a better understanding of the world around them. We have had activities all week, focused on reading for learning. Please do read with your children and, as they get older, get them to read a quality newspaper with you so you can discuss the current affairs and world topics as and when they arise.

As part of Trinity Futures Fortnight the primary were joined by three 'grown up' Trinitarians from the secondary phase. They spoke to the children about what transitioning to secondary school is like and what they enjoyed most about it. Young enterprise were in working with pupils on creating their CV and interview techniques. An architect came to share with us what she had designed and which buildings were created from her own imagination. We had several university Ambassadors in helping Year 8 think about their option choices as well as small group impartial careers advice for everyone in the year. Year 7 had a fun day with a truly European team from Lego looking at solutions to world problems (deforestation, gang violence and homelessness) through Lego. Did you know that Lego produces more tyres than anyone else in the world!!! Finally Inner Drive were back working with many of our academically able pupils, looking at the 'Mastery Mindset'. Trinity Futures might be drawing to a close, but throughout the year we will continue to run activities that enable pupils to be exposed to a vast variety of choices and options for their very own futures. We believe in opening minds for all our young learners.

We had a group of over 30 pupils return from Berlin on Tuesday night. An amazing trip that took the pupils to a former concentration camp at Sachsenhausen, the Berlin Olympic Stadium built for the 1936 Olympics, Wansee house (the place of the 'final solution'), the remnants of the Berlin Wall, headquarters of the Stasi and The Reichstag building to name but a few of the highlights. Residential trips are vital, we have just launched our Skiing trip and Italy trip for next year. The rest of this year sees a group go to Spain for an outward bound adventure as well as a residential in the UK looking at outdoor pursuits. All these trips help develop our pupils' experiences.

Assessments continue across the school, with Year 10 next week and year 9 the week after. Year 11 have only 7 School weeks left until their GCSE exams begin. Time does fly by so please do make sure your son / daughter gets into a habit of reading at home every day. In Year 7 onwards there is an expectation that all pupils practice their knowledge retrieval skills for an hour every day, which gets longer as they move through the school. Parents can get involved. Look at the knowledge organisers and test them on the content. They should know the whole of last half term's material off by heart by now – and developing this half term's material as we speak. Please check they are doing this from Year 7 to Year 11.

This Wednesday we started our Lent preparations with an Ash Wednesday service in the secondary school. The focus was on giving something up for Lent and thinking what we could do with the extra time gained. We discussed reading more books, taking on new sports or learning a new musical instrument. For some there is the need to focus more on school work at home to secure greater progress. I wonder how many would give up their technology for 40 days!!!! How many of us adults would give up our phone?

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER By Reverend Juliet Evans

"Even now," declares the Lord, "return to me with all your heart, with fasting and weeping and mourning." Rend your heart and not your garments. Return to the Lord your God, for he is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and abounding in love, and he relents from sending calamity.

Joel 2: 12-13

In worship this week we have been getting ready to begin the season of Lent. We remembered that we enjoy pancakes on Shrove Tuesday before we commit to a Lent discipline. We also remembered that ash is used as we begin Lent to help us to focus on living good lives. Our reading this week reminds us to return to God's love. 



Trinity Futures 2019

Year 10 Business Challenge

We have had another busy week to close Trinity Futures 2019. Year 10 were visited by Aaron Townsend and had the opportunity to learn about his career as a chartered accountant. The group then took part in the 'Spotify Challenge'. Pupils had to engage with business accounts and take on the role of business analysts. The challenge was to look at the financial evidence and devise a plan on how to help Spotify grow into a better business. Pupils were able to draw on their own knowledge of the music industry, consider the market for themselves as consumers as well as looking for gaps in the market and finding a consumer that has not yet been tapped into. There were some very creative and insightful plans and ideas put forward by year 10.



Year 7 Apps For Good

The theme of courageous advocacy and being principled and caring young people was prominent in today's Trinity Futures session for a group of year 7 pupils. Using Lego and creating an app, year 7 pupils considered some of the challenges facing the world today. They used Lego to creatively demonstrate their chosen issue and then designed an app to help tackle this problem. Deforestation, knife crime and homelessness were among the most prominent concerns in the group. Pupils had to use problem solving skills to think about how modern technology could be used to help tackle some of these problems. They used their communication and public speaking skills to present their app designs to the group.



Year 8 Option Choices

This week all Y8 students experienced a lesson on Option Choices, led by Deb Wipfler a professional Career Adviser.

Students were provided with important information on how subjects will impact on future career choices. Students were given an understanding of qualifications, grades and requirements, for particular career paths.

Some discussion took place about POST 16 choices and Higher Education and how they differ. Along with the benefit of outside school interests and activities supported by the Trinity Charter.

Students were asked to recognise their personal strengths and specific career ideas were discussed.

All students completed a worksheet indicating their preferred option choices, hobbies, confidence and behaviour and current career ideas.

Students get to see the range of subjects that they will be able to choose from. They had lots of questions about different careers and took the choices towards their future seriously.

GEOGRAPHY

"Year 8 were given into an insight into studying a Geography degree when Syed, a 2nd year physical geography student at Queen Mary University and Royal Geographical Society schools' ambassador, delivered a geography session during their lessons. Syed informed pupils of what degrees they may wish to study in the future and what careers and skills they could develop as a result. Pupils discovered that Geography affected their everyday lives from what they ate for breakfast to the clothes they were wearing. Geography is one of the most employable degrees and we hope that Syed's visit inspired our pupils to consider a geography path in the future."



RE LESSONS

During RE lessons, the year 9 pupils have started exploring social issues and considering the issues that are priorities for them to focus on. Attached are some examples of the challenges that they have identified, which affect individuals or groups of people in our community.

The objective of these lessons is to give pupils the opportunity to become more outward facing and take steps towards making a positive impact in the local community.

Pupils will carry out research, decide which social action(s) to take and create a presentation. The winning group with the best presentation and pitch will receive £1,000 for their chosen charity. This is an exciting opportunity for pupils to make a difference in the lives of others.

GEOGRAPHY

The geography department hosted the Royal Geographical Lectures this week during Tuesday lunch time. The topic was- "are the Sustainable Development Goals: ambition or fantasy? Presented by Social Scientist Linden Edgell . A group of year 9-11 pupils attended which will not only add greater depth to their understanding but will develop their understanding of the complexities of the world ready for 6th form and scholarship interviews". Next lecture on the 12th March, Brexit: causes and consequences - Professor Matthew Goodwin Professor Matthew Goodwin examines the drivers of the vote for Brexit, what it tells us about public opinion and party politics in Britain and what might happen next. On Wednesday a group of Year 10 students were invited to attend a Colfe's trip to Fitzwilliam College, Cambridge University. The idea of the day was to introduce the idea of Oxbridge to interested students, as well as help them prepare for "life after school".

The students were given a tour of the college by third year students who talked them through what it was like to study and live at Fitzwilliam College. After a talk on what studying at university entails and how to apply, students were then split into groups for two activities.

The first activity was a career game, where students were asked to match up Cambridge graduates with their A level subjects, degree choice and current career. It was interesting to see how people's A levels led to a variety of different degree subjects, and also how varied their careers were. In some cases students were working in fields quite different than expected, showing how flexible a degree is.

The second activity was a debating workshop. Groups were split in to 2 with one side arguing for and one against on a variety of topics. Cambridge admissions say that students who come to interview, whilst having excellent academic results, can often not speak comfortably either in an interview scenario or to a wider audience. This activity gave our students a great opportunity to practise this skill and to speak to strangers to try and convince them of an opinion they may not necessarily have held personally. Well done to all our Trinity students, many of who were the leaders of their groups.

Miss DiRicci was additionally impressed that the coffee came with a raspberry loveheart!




Berlin History trip 2019

29 brave students and 3 members of staff recently set off on a 3 day History tour of Berlin, Germany. The site of much conflict in the 20th century, students were toured around the city by our wonderful guide catching a glimpse of the remains of the Berlin Wall, diving into the depths of the Stasi control (Secret East German police), seeing the majestic Olympic Stadium home to the 1936 Olympic Games (from which Jesse Owens rose to fame), climbing to the top of the Reichstag for a 360 degree view of the city and remembering those who lost their lives as a result of the Nazi regime through memorials and visiting a former concentration camp, Sachsenhausen.

All students had a highly educational and enjoyable time with some personal highlights being: a first ever plane flight, being caught in a storm with no cover in sight, braving extreme tiredness to walk many miles around a city, surviving 3 whole days without some 'necessary' beauty products, the ease of the Berlin U-Bahn and of course the selection of German food on offer (although most weren't sold on the currywurst).

Students represented Trinity with great pride and the experience has helped broaden their historical context of life in Germany from 1939 onwards. In the words of one student "I will definitely have to pressure mum into letting me come back. I could have spent another few hours in Wansee House and the German National Museum".
