

YEAR 10 STUDENT REPORTER - TOMMY MELLUISH

Welcome to the Student Report, a weekly section of the newsletter, where you can get some insight into the life and events of a Trinity Student. This week I will be talking about my Activities Week and information for next week.



Firstly, this week saw Trinity host their first ever activities week this week. Students had the choice to choose from a range of activities including water sports, tours of London and Maths activities. I chose Add it up, a maths based option. On Monday, it was scheduled that those participating in Add it up would be going to the Emirates Aviation Experience in North Greenwich where Students would ride on the Airline Simulators and the Cable cars. However, I was invited to go on a different trip by Ms Di Ricci. This trip was to The Royal Institution in Mayfair where 3 mathematicians would show us and allow students to participate in Maths games, interlecturing students of the use of maths which can be used in real life. The trip was very interesting and informed me of the many uses Maths has in the daily life. On Tuesday, the Add it up groups went to the Bank of England, where we learnt about bank notes and how money has evolved in the UK. This was very informing of the UK's past and present economy and I got a rough idea of what England's economy could be like post Brexit. On Wednesday, for periods 1 and 2, Mr Williams led a lesson on bearings and compass directions. During periods 3 and 4, half of the students doing add it up went to Manor House Gardens to do some orienteering. This was really fun for me personally because it was my first experience of orienteering and is something I definitely would want to do again. For Periods 5 and 6, we then went to a nearby field to do some outdoor cooking in groups. This was something I'd had little experience of doing however I feel I've developed my outdoor cooking skills to an extent where I'd feel confident to cook outside on an open fire. On Thursday, the other half of those participating in Add it Up participated in the activities that my half completed on Wednesday whilst the half I was in spent the day in school. We learnt about Constructing Shapes using compasses with Miss Newsome, drawing impossible objects again using a compass with Miss Turkington before practising and participating in the Secondary Maths Challenge with Miss Newsome and Miss Zlateva, where we was split into groups of 4s/5s and had to play a selection of given Maths games including Hex and the 24 game. My group, team unknown, won the challenge and received a prize for our efforts.



At the time of writing, the trip to Greenwich Park has not commenced however I'm sure it'll be a great day! Overall, I really enjoyed Activities Week because firstly I love Maths so almost a whole week of Maths was great but I also found it good meeting people in other years and talking to them and working together to complete the work. A massive thank you goes out to all teachers who took part in setting up activities for Activities Week, you did really well!

Next week will be normal school starting and finishing times with exception of Friday where school will finish at 12pm as we will be breaking up for the summer holidays. Students should be receiving their reports next week so a good luck goes out to everyone for their results.
